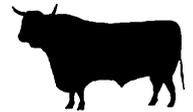

Roman Villa Open Day

The Open Day for the Roman Villa Dig in Lower Woods back in July was blessed with good weather. As a result there were quite a lot of visitors peering down holes and examining various pieces of Roman pottery and central heating artefacts (hypocaust ducts). The site is close to a pre-Roman track down from the escarpment which led to the Roman town at Hall End Farm, Wickwar. Experts on hand explained that we were seeing both parts of a villa and a large agricultural building. The latter is hypothesised to be the Roman version of a tithe barn (having tax gathering functions) which had under floor corn dryers. Thanks are due to the Hawkesbury Local History Society for organising this event.

Closure of Road at Badminton Station Bridge, Acton Turville

After many years the bridge crossing the railway at the entrance to Acton Turville is to be replaced. The bridge has had a weight restriction on it for many years, but will be replaced on the weekend of 25th September.

News from Horton School

It has been a busy and exciting time since we last wrote an article for the village newsletter! Earlier this month, for instance, you may have noticed a number of Romans walking through the village; they were on their way to school where we held a Roman day for the first day back at school.



The children trained as gladiators and centurions to fight off marauding pirates; built aqueducts; designed and printed Roman style art and patterns and took part in a Roman Senate to recommend the rules for the school for this year. You may think this all sounds a

lot of fun, and it was, but it had another purpose too – it allowed the children to rebuild old or create new friendships as many may not have seen each other over the long summer holiday and it made the first day back exciting so providing a real kick start to this year's learning. The Romans is our whole school study area up until Christmas and if you'd like to get involved in this and have an area of expertise you would like to share then we'd love to hear from you.

Two highlights from last term were Business Enterprise Week (Dragon's Den competitions; managing money; looking at marketing and advertising; building a business) and an overnight stay in school to support the Giant Sleepover. The part of Business Enterprise week most of the children liked best was the market on the Friday where they had to sell goods and services created by their team from a £10 investment which they had to at least double. The winning team made a 250% profit – something most businesses would be proud of.



All the proceeds have gone to twin our new school toilets with toilets in Burundi. The overnight stay was part of our "Extended Schools" provision where we provide regular opportunities for children outside the normal school day. The younger children came for an activity evening which encompassed crafts and games and the older children then stayed on and took part in a night walk, camp fire singing and a sleepover (not much sleeping!). And, last but not least we have a new school sign that all the children had a hand in designing and making.



You will have noticed over the summer that yet again we had the builders in. This time they have been putting in new toilets and changing the corridor that runs along the back of the school to make it wider and brighter. The children love the new arrangements and it makes the school look much more modern inside. This summer, thanks to some volunteer help from members of the school community, we stripped and repainted the library, hopefully keeping the damp problem at bay.

This is now a much brighter and welcoming space that will be used for one-to-one tuition and small group sessions.

We have a new school vision which comes under the headline of "Learning, Caring, Exploring, Sharing". The new school vision, which takes account of feedback from all members of the school community, positions the school as:

- a place of excellence; an innovative Church school
- a stimulating environment where children enjoy achieving full potential in their academic, creative, personal, physical, moral and spiritual development
- a caring place where the individuality, gifts and talents of all children and adults are nurtured
- a community living and learning through Christian values
- a partnership between children, parents, staff, governors, the Church and the community as a whole.

As part of making the school a stimulating place to be we have various activities that enable the children to explore learning outside the more traditional routes, one of which is through music. A small group of the Junior children now regularly perform for a Senior Citizens group in Chipping Sodbury and our Ukulele Choir has been asked to perform again at an event at St Mary's Church in Yate on the 18th September at 2:30 pm. Why not come along and see/listen to them?

Ian Cross, our Chair of Governors, is aiming to build up a School Support Group made up of members of the village. If you have skills, interests, resources or just time which you would be happy to share with the school then please contact Ian directly or contact us at school and we'll happily pass the message on!

I know that some of you are concerned about the parking around school and I appreciate your patience whilst we try and improve the situation. We encourage the children (and parents) to walk to school in the morning, parking at the Village Hall, and many of them do this when time allows; all the children are walked down the hill in the afternoons in our walking bus for collection from the village hall. Staff park at school when they are involved in transporting children, carrying books/resources or running clubs/attending after school meetings or have tight timescales to collect their own children... which is, if I'm honest, most days for most of us! We do try and park considerately but if you feel there is a persistent issue then please contact the school and we will try and resolve the situation.

Finally I would like to draw your attention to three of our future events that are listed on the first page of this Newsletter. These are: a Christmas Shopping Evening on 17th November, our Village carol singing on 8th December and our end of term Christmas service on 16th December.

FUTURE EVENTS

South Glos Transport Policy

Have your say on transport

Where do you think your local council should spend its transport budget? Improving access to public transport, introducing more road safety schemes, encouraging more people to take up cycling, or maintaining the district's roads?

These are some of the questions South Gloucestershire Council will be asking residents at consultation events organised to encourage more people to have their say about the future of their transport system.

South Gloucestershire Council, along with three other councils in the West of England region, is putting together a plan for transport over the next 15 years and these events will give local residents a chance to feed in to the plan.

The consultation events take place at the following times/locations:

- Thornbury Town Centre (near Aldi) on Monday 13th September from 11am to 3pm;
- Kings Chase shopping centre, Kingswood on Tuesday 14 September from 11am to 3pm.

The new plan will set out the future goals for transport and how the West of England region will try to achieve these goals between 2011 and 2026.

Councillor Brian Allinson, executive member for planning, transportation and strategic environment, said: "It's really important that we understand our residents' priorities for transport in the area. I would urge as many people as possible to complete the questionnaire and have their say."

Residents can complete a questionnaire at www.transportmatters.org or pick up a paper copy at your local council office or library. All completed questionnaires will be entered into a free prize draw to win a day out at one of the region's best local attractions, including the Avon Valley Railway, the SS Great Britain in Bristol, the Helicopter Museum in Weston-Super-Mare or the Boating Station in Bath.

You can read the draft plan and all the supplementary documents online, or read a printed version at your local library or council office. Transport affects everyone and we want to know your views.

The consultation deadline is Monday 4th October.
