HORTON WALKING FESTIVAL APRIL 2012

DUCKS AT THE VILLAGE POND

In the Ordnance Survey publication "A Recreational Path Guide to the Cotswold Way", there is a description of the main sights to be appreciated on entering Horton:

"The route passes Horton Court, at the heart of which is a single storey Norman hall house, home to the prebendary of the adjoining church......Turn left at the road. The small pond opposite contains a very large duck population".

For the past few years, walkers looking forward to meeting the very large duck population will have been disappointed as the said population has fallen away, maybe as a result of Mr Fox, duck thieves, drought, emigration or a combination of these factors. The pond has been sadly vacant. The Newsletter is therefore pleased to report that due to the efforts of David and Linda Bricknell at The Cottage (on whose land the pond is located), ducks have been reintroduced to the pond.

So far, there is one male and one female mallard duck who appear to be settling into their new home, especially with the current abundance of rain which has filled the pond.

As a result of careful selection and some genetic modification, it is expected that the new occupants will be far more resilient to the advances of predators or even stray pellets emanating from pheasant shoots. Passers-by however are requested not to feed the ducks or to throw bread into the pond. This could imbalance the special diet on which the ducks are being reared and could even suppress their natural mating instincts.

We wish the ducks a long and happy life in the Cottage Pond and if "Ronseal" does exactly what it says on the tin, there is no reason to doubt that the ducks will be there for many future generations of walkers to enjoy.

Finally you may be interested to know that a geophysical survey of Horton hill fort is planned for June/July of this year. This will be conducted by the Community Archaeology Officer of South Glos. Council, with support from the Yate & District Archaeology Group and the Horton History Society. This is quite a large site to survey and will probably require volunteers from these local societies to cover the ground adequately. If you are interested in following developments or actively helping then you should contact one of these local societies – be aware that some training would be necessary and that magnetometer surveys require personnel to be metal-free.

FIRST FULL PEAL OF THE HORTON CHURCH BELLS

The first full peal of the Horton Church bells in recorded history took place on Sunday 8th April 2012 under the auspices of the Gloucester & Bristol Diocesan Association. Members of the ringing team were: Rex Isaac (1), John Cornock (2), Jane D Bull (3), David A C Matthews (4), David J Kelly (5), Andrew M Bull (6). The full peal, known technically as a 5040 Plain Bob Major, was completed in 2hr 57min.

In the past (since 1649) the church bells had been a ring of five but they had become unusable in 1914. Now fully renovated and extended to a ring of six bells, the full peal was rung to the memory of the late Rev. Gordon H Edwards, whose vision the restored and augmented ring was, and whose tenacity through a five year battle saw the scheme to fruition.

Congratulations are due to Rex Isaac as the first Horton ringer to ring a full peel on the recently restored bells - he may never venture there again. We also need some new ringers to start learning now to augment the main group. We also have four very experienced ringers who assist us so you will be getting tuition of the highest order. Our usual practice night is on a Wednesday followed by a very social drink at the Social Club. Horton tower is known for its relaxed attitude so if you want to try bell ringing with no pressure please contact Rex Isaac or any of the regular ringers for more information.

ENERGY NEIGHBOURHOODS

Is anyone interested in the idea of saving 9% on their fuel bills? If you are, read on.

The Energy Neighbourhood project is looking for groups of people, anywhere between 5 and 18 households to form a team. The team will be given support, encouragement, advice and incentives to help them individually and collectively reduce their household energy consumption by 9% between 1 December 2012 and 31 March 2013. The key to this project is that the energy savings be made by behavioural change only – no investment is needed. The project helps people make the connection between household energy consumption and how they do things around the home. The savings are monitored through the participants taking weekly energy meter readings and inputting them onto the website which then demonstrates any savings made (or not).

Each group will need an energy master - this is someone who will receive training on how to save energy in the home and who will encourage and support the rest of their group and will be able to monitor how the group is doing.

As you will have noticed the project doesn't officially start until Dec 2012; however there is work to do ahead of this such as training the energy master and getting participants to gather together past energy bills.

I've asked the Editor to include this in the newsletter as I wondered whether anyone else would be interested in getting together to make up a team. Apparently in the last phase of the competition there were 3 teams from South Glos and they did very well. As some of you will already be aware my business does involve energy efficiency (I'm a Domestic Energy Assessor); however I would like to make it clear that I am only putting the idea forward on a personal front: my business will not benefit; my only financial benefit will be through the energy that Chris and myself may save if we take part.
