



Now a date for your 2024 diary.



It really was an entertaining and informative talk on an extraordinary topic about a remarkable man.


Donations from the evening's talk went to our Christmas (Tumaini UK) appeal – a further £124 was raised, bringing the overall total to £454.

Yes, it's déjà vu all over again ☺





News from Horton Church

Richard Winsborrow writes:

As many of you will know, our Rector (David Bowers) retired last year. Steps have been taken to recruit a replacement, but this is proving to be a time-consuming process. Nevertheless, a full range of services is being offered to the community in the interim; these are being conducted by a team of (partially) retired clergy and the Curate attached to the Benefice.

The summer teas programme last year was very successful both from a social and a fund-raising perspective. Many thanks to all of you who participated in what proved to be a set of enjoyable events for those not concerned with calorie control. We hope to run a similar programme in 2023.

As you will recollect one of the key drivers for the teas was fund-raising for roof repairs. The 2022 programme actually collected somewhat in excess of £3k for this purpose. Together with specific one-off donations this has been sufficient to commission the first stages of the roof repairs – namely a detailed site survey and the development of a specification of required works.

The site survey took place in mid-February. We expect that the detailed specification of works will follow on in the near future. At that point we will have a more accurate picture of the total funding requirement. We expect the total cost to be in excess of an initial ball-park estimate of £80K. In addition, to local fund-raising activities it is clear that we will need to submit requests for funding from several organisations that make grants to churches for repair and maintenance purposes. Recently, for instance, Arlingham Church obtained grants from nine sources for similar purposes.

There is an annual meeting organised by the church management committee which all parishioners are invited to attend. The meeting is scheduled for 25th April starting at 7pm this year. It takes the form of three meetings held in sequence: the first is the Annual Meeting of Parishioners at which churchwardens are elected; the second is the so-



called Annual Parochial Church Meeting which takes reports on progress and the finances over the past year and elects new members to the church management committee (aka Parochial Church Council); and, finally, a PCC meeting to set dates for its further meetings for the year. You are welcome to participate in these meetings. If you wish to do so please send an email to hpcc@tadorna.org.uk for further details. A venue for the meeting will be selected based on the level of expected participation.

Finally, it goes almost without saying, that it is always great to see new faces at services, so please come along and join us, and if you'd like to be more involved in any of our activities please let us know.
